Rudy has led Othello to four state titles in 1999, 2002, 2008, and 2016. He's been named Washington Coach of the Year five times and was inducted into the WSCA Hall of Fame in 2011.

OHS Teachers Run Bloomsday!

The Lilac Bloomsday run, also known as Bloomsday, is a 12k (7.46 mile) road race held annually on the first Sunday in May in Spokane, Washington. This race attracts thousands of runners, typically drawing over 30,000 people from across the country and globe. The course starts in downtown Spokane and heads west before heading up the infamous "Doomsday Hill."

While the course is difficult, and many elite athletes are competing for time, the event is also a fun celebration. Many people dress up in costumes and walk the course, spectators line the streets of Spokane with homemade signs, there are bands at several points along the course, and people even set up concessions to sell popsicles, donuts, and beverages.

Ms. Armfield is involved in the Spokane running community and has participated in Bloomsday for the last decade. "I have been running Bloomsday for the past 10 years and don't want to lose my streak now! I used to be in much better shape, but this year I'm just hoping to go out there, do my best, and have a good time running with thousands of my friends."

Mr. Shafer said, "This will be my 8th time to run it. It has become a tradition for me and my family. I run with my wife, while my kids hang out at my brother's house a few blocks from the route. They sit out and cheer for people. My parents are in a cover band, and they have played at Bloomsday for the last few years. It is fun to see them play. After the race, we all go back to my brother's house for a cookout."

This year several OHS teachers participated in the race: Bob Kehret, Paul Firth, Hector Aranzazu, Eric Shafer, Allison Armfield, and Brisa Montejano.

Mr. Kehret has ran Bloomsday for over 20 years, "I got started in 1993, my brother in law got me involved. My brother in law is no longer able to do it so I either do it with myself or other friends. I love the tradition of it (doomsday hill, the nuns that come out to say hi, the guessing of what color the t-shirt will be, running through the cups, etc). I also love that Bloomsday is the "unofficial" start of spring."

This is Mr. Firth's third year running the race - his first being a virtual run during COVID where he and Mr. Aranzazu recreated a course here in Othello!


